ORLANDO, Fla. (Nov. 13, 2009) - Recognizing the critical and formative role of landscape and the environment in the American experience, the Orlando Museum of Art (OMA) will present *Changing Landscapes, Changing Visions* in collaboration with 20 arts, cultural, scientific, educational and media organizations. The seven-month project will include four outstanding exhibitions of art of the American landscape and dynamic educational and collaborative programming focusing on the changing American landscape and related issues of conservation and "greening."

Nature & Spirit: American Art of the 19th and 20th Centuries

Artists help shape our concept of what we see as beautiful and inspiring about nature. This exhibition will feature 25 paintings, sculptures, ceramics and other decorative arts of the mid-19th century to the mid-20th century. The selections will offer a historical overview of the engagement of leading American artists with the landscape and show some of the ways in which evolving ideas about nature are expressed in art.

Without a Trace: Artists Imagine a World Without Us

Alan Weisman's novel, *The World Without Us*, is an imaginative but well-researched exploration of just how nature would go about un-doing what civilization has wrought. At times frightening, and sometimes encouraging, Weisman's work of fiction served as the inspiration for this exhibition. Featuring significant works of contemporary art from local collections, this exhibition will provide an objective look at how the natural world could encroach on our manmade landscape and the human will to survive and leave a mark.

Clyde Butcher: Big Cypress Swamp and the Western Everglades

Big Cypress Swamp is an exhibition of 40 stunning large-format black and white photographs and a video documentary depicting the beauty and fragility of the Western Everglades. In the tradition of Ansel Adams' iconic large-format photographs of Yellowstone and Yosemite, Butcher composes his works at pristine locations across the Big Cypress Swamp creating arresting compositions that distinctly mark him as the foremost landscape photographer of natural Florida.

Transcending Vision: American Impressionism 1870-1940

04.10.10 - 07.18.10

This exhibition will feature 125 paintings that demonstrate how American artists successfully transformed French Impressionism into their own artistic style. They redefined Impressionism as a means of depicting the American rural and urban landscape and of expressing ideas about how the rapidly changing country saw itself. Paintings by artists such as Herman Herzog, Childe Hassam, George Inness and John Sloan will illustrate the full range of Impressionist qualities that captivated artists and audiences during that period as they still do today. This exhibition will be provided by the Bank of America Art in our Communities program.

This exhibition represents the first retrospective of the artist's work in North America since 1974. Included will be 100 paintings, sculptures, and drawings culled from the artist's private collection. Many works have never been exhibited in public. Travelers will also stop at the new Moran Art Center in St. Petersburg. Included in the price are all admission charges, lunch, refreshments en route, and transportation.

Fernando Botero is a Latin American painter, sculptor, and draftsman who depicts the comedy of human life-moving or ironic, baroque in expression, sometimes with a mocking observation, and sometimes with a deep, elementary emotion. He has created a world of his own with a particular blend of violence and beauty.
